Some Valuable Tools for Bible Study

A. Bible(s)

- When studying God's Word, it's good to compare translations.
- Formal Equivalence (aka Word-for-Word): <u>KJV</u>, <u>NKJV</u>, <u>NASB</u>, <u>ESV</u>, <u>NET</u> & <u>HCSB</u>
- Dynamic Equivalence (aka Thought-for-Thought): NIV, NLT, & CEV

B. Commentaries

- <u>Dr. Thomas Constable's Expository Notes</u>—best free commentary
- The Bible Knowledge Commentary
- The Believer's Bible Commentary by William MacDonald

C. Lexicons

- A lexicon is essentially a dictionary which typically contains more information about words than a normal dictionary.
- New Testament: Thayer's Greek Lexicon; Vines Expository Dictionary of NT Words.
- Old Testament: <u>Brown-Driver-Briggs Hebrew Lexicon</u>; <u>Vines Expository Dictionary</u> of OT Words.
- Goodnews: You can access these free online.

D. Concordance

- A Bible concordance is a reference tool that lists words and phrases found in the Bible in alphabetical order. It helps you locate where these terms appear throughout the scriptures.
- Goodnews: These help you to search for words in the Bible. But you don't need these if you are using a Bible app or online, because they will search for words much faster than using a concordance.

- e-Sword (Windows, Android, Apple, iPad, iPhone): e-Sword is user friendly with more capabilities than you would expect in a free Bible study app (e-sword.net).
- BibleTime (Windows, Apple, Linux): A cross-platform Bible study tool that includes over 200 free Bible texts, commentaries, dictionaries, and books (bibletime.info).
- Bible Analyzer (Windows & Apple): Known for its extensive library of free add-on modules and user-friendly interface. It's available for Windows, Mac, and Linux (bibleanalyzer.com).
- The Word (Windows): A portable Bible program that will also work when installed on a USB stick! An impressive list of Bible Modules in all kinds of languages (theword.net).
- STEP Bible (online app): Offers a wide range of translations and tools for in-depth Bible study. It's available for Windows, Mac, and even mobile devices (stepbible.org).
- YouVersion (Android, iOS, online @ Bible.com): It is probably the most popular Bible app. However, it has some issues concerning data collection and privacy. It also has partnered with questionable teachers such as Joel Osteen, Bill Johnson (Bethel), Kenneth Copeland and others (bible.com).
